The East End Photographers Group will present "Sun, Sand & Surf" an exhibit of diverse photographic imagery, featuring traditional, digital and alternative photographic processes—carrying out its mission to promote photography and the visual arts in a community setting. The EEPG encourages photographic artists to exhibit new work at each show and provides support and a forum for new artists who are just beginning to exhibit their work and realize their personal vision.

Thirty Squared "Summer Finale 2024" Thursday, September 5—Sunday, September 15, 2024 Reception: Saturday, September 7, 4 to 7 pm

The Thirty Squared painting group was formed in January of 2015 when artist Aubrey Grainger challenged her Facebook friends to Paint 30 paintings in 30 days. The result was an exhibit featuring the fun, lively and free-spirited work of 18 artists. This year participating artists were asked to paint every day for 30 days, either doing a painting a day or working longer on more developed pieces. 
Helen Giaquinto "Less is More" Thursday, September 19—Sunday, September 29 Reception: Saturday, September 21, 1 to 4 pm

This exhibit is about simplicity, in elements of line, shape, color, style and subject, to enjoy and explore.

Water Mill - Shop - Tea Room - Restaurant - Museum

1644-1900 Edward Howell built a water powered grist mill which operated until the early 1900's. It was purchased in 1825 by John Benedict. When milling ceased, the building was used to store ice harvested from Mill Pond. Ice cream was manufactured

in the basement from the abundant cream from local dairies. The building was also used as a meeting place for various organizations such as Boys Clubs and the Grange.



Mill Village Improvement Society was established.

1920–The LAWM began leasing the Mill from the Benedict family. This continued for several years—the rent in 1941 was \$10 per month.

The New York State Bureau of Services to the Blind established



a satellite operation from the Old Water Mill Shop and Tea Room. The first director was Alice K.P. Brice. She was followed by Grace O'Hara who served for many years (until 1957).

The shop stocked and sold items handmade by the blind adults throughout NY State and the proceeds of the sales were sent back

to the bureau (later termed the NYS Commission for the Blind).

The Shop and Tea Room (via the Ladies Auxiliary) was responsible for the facility and employed waitresses and supervisory positions. The purpose of the Tea Room was to make shopping a



pleasant experience. The Tea Room became quite popular after being promoted by its many patronesses. During the summer months, various days were set aside for groups from individual villages, and the patroness (or patronesses) of that village was in charge of inviting ladies and acting as the hostess for the day.

According to old records, in August 1934, 1,240 ladies were served. In 1939 the shop handled 15,000 articles, the Tea Room served 1,232 lunches at an average price of \$.83, 138 dinners at \$.98, and 1,014 teas at \$.50.



1942–The Ladies Auxiliary purchased the Mill and continued the Shop and Tea Room until 1957. They were continually making



improvements to the Mill, indoors and out.

1950-1960's In addition to being a Shop and Tea Room, cooking classes were offered. At some point the building was leased to Jen Berkoski who ran her "Old Mill" restaurant in the Mill.

1968-1976 The Ladies Auxiliary Water Mill restored the building as a museum and the Mill was grinding once again for our nation's bicentennial.

1977-Present The Water Mill Museum has been open to the

public with exhibits that relate to Water Mill's history and people, and with demonstrations and lectures on its history and relevant topics.
