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A Message From Our President

The Water Mill Museum is kicking off the 2025 season on May 23rd with our 33rd Annual Members' Art Show. On June 11th from 4-6 pm our Museum Board will be holding a reception to

celebrate all of our talented members whose generous support helps keep the mill running. The museum is also hosting a number of art shows in our gallery throughout the summer and fall. The complete schedule can be found on our website.

An ongoing mission of the museum is to provide educational programs geared for all ages, and we are excited to be collaborating with Stacy Meyers, the Director of Education at the East Hampton

Historical Society, on a number of projects that will be held at the mill. We will also be continuing our children's milling program with dates in July and August as well as a quilting event during our 38th annual quilt show and sale.

This year was finally cold enough for some iceboating on Mill Pond and on Mecox, so be sure to come visit our iceboating exhibit which will be updated with new photographs from this winter. If you time your visit right, you might even catch one of our veteran iceboaters giving a firsthand account.

Thanks in part to a grant from the Town of Southampton, we are installing a new exhibit this year with photographs and a model of the original tub wheel that is still housed in the lower level of

"Explorations"

Thursday, September 18 – Sunday, October 5, 2025 Reception: Saturday, September 20, 4 to 6pm

The exploration of unpredictability best describes my continuing study of photographic light drawings and monotype prints. Both artistic approaches create compositions which project a sense of light, energy and movement forming patterns that invite subjective interpretations. The intentional camera movements and creating the monotype plates both lead to unpredictability of abstract form, color, movement and spatial relationships.

Wendy Ambrozewicz has been organizing the Water Mill Community Club's and Museum's archives for nearly two years and has now completed this important project. Here is Wendy's description of her work:

As I approach the end of the Water Mill archives project, I feel a bit of melancholy. This has been an incredible experience both professionally and personally, and I am excited to see how the Museum and other local organizations utilize the work I've done, but I am also sad to no longer be immersed in such unique, fun, challenging work.



My family is from

New York, but I grew up in northeastern Maryland. After moving to NY for college and library school, I became interested in the history of Long Island and sought opportunities to use my skills, such as this project. I would like to thank everyone I met through the project, and especially everyone who helped.



Over the last nearly two years, I went

through closets, cabinets, dozens of boxes, and hundreds of folders. I designated a primary 'subject' for each document or item, and arranged like items in new, archival folders and boxes. I cataloged each item in a spreadsheet according to date, number of pages, title/description, and often additional notes. I scanned each item (minus a few large items), and uploaded TIF, JPG, and often PDF formats to a secure cloud

platform. The only items discarded were exact copies on regular paper. I removed metal fasteners, rubber bands, and Post-Its, and put highly acidic materials (such as newspaper clippings) into their own folder inserts within larger folders. I repaired and stabilized items when necessary, including archival boxes and special ties to secure rare books. I overhauled the Museum's video player hardware, and oversaw brand-new videos and the conversion of 60 oral history tapes to digital.

As for volume, the Museum and the Community House each hold over 10,000 documents, photos, ephemeral objects (i.e. ads and news publications), and more.

How can you view and enjoy these items? New York Heritage! NYH is a collaboration between the Empire State Library network and over 430 libraries, museums, and cultural institutions, including the Water Mill Museum. There are currently 4 collections up on the Water Mill Museum NYHeritage websites, profile, and several more are to come. Items not suitable for NYHeritage may be available digitally for research use; in-person use depends on organizational policies.

Some of my favorite parts of the collections:

- Papers of Gideon Halsey, coroner, 1801-1806
- Water Mill School District Trustee Minutes, 1833-1857
- Coins from 1854, found underneath the Corwith Windmill in the late 1980s
- The Old Water Mill guest book, 1936-1947 (already on NYHeritage!)
- Friends of Lake Nowedonah newsletters, 1990-1993
- Suffolk County Air Raid Signals poster, undated (WWII)

East Hampton Students To Study The Mill

Stacy Meyers, director of education at the East Hampton Historical Society, will be bringing a group of grade-school

students to study the water mill this May. This exciting initiative will launch the Museum's mission of partnering with the Historical Society and other fellow organizations. Stacy Meyers and Sandy Raynor agree that our museum is a good fit for



collaboration with the Historical Society. Discussions are underway for developing future programs.

In March, Stacy Meyers spoke with Rachel Verno, our museum director and manager, about her plans for the May study tour. Here are highlights from their conversation:

Rachel Verno: You'll be bringing your students to the museum to study the water mill and also the windmill. Would you tell us about the program you have planned?

Stacy Meyers: We are so excited to teach science and engineering with your team in May. I have taught many classes in the Gardiner Windmill and the Pantigo Mill in East Hampton over the years. When I learned the Corwith Mill was being restored, I thought how cool it would be for our students to tour a windmill and a water mill in one day.

The students will explore topics similar to but not limited to:

Throughout human history, waterwheels and windmills performed many types of mechanical work: saw timber, drive pumps, run farm equipment, trip hammers, grind grains into flour, make iron products, and power textile mills.

Humans have been harnessing renewable energy for thousands of years, and maybe this type of progressive place-based education will encourage our next environmental engineer or architect. The windmill is an incredible machine, and to stand inside the mill with the gears and levers surrounding you is a stunning example of our architecture and engineering.

Recycling Shingles Into Artwork

Louis Puglisi, a good friend of the Museum, often contributes handmade items for sale in the gift shop. This year, Louis has found a unique source of raw material for his artwork: recycled shingles from the Corwith windmill.

This winter, as the restoration of the windmill got underway, Louis noticed the workmen throwing discarded wood shingles into a dumpster. He felt sad that these historic shingles were being unceremoniously tossed away. Then he thought, "Why not repurpose these wood slats into paintings? I could take the shingles from the dumpster and paint a



picture on them. That way, the shingles could once again be useful." He quickly set about transforming the wood shingles with colorful artwork. His painted wood shingles will be on display and for sale at the Museum gift shop this spring.

Rachel Verno: Do you change your curriculum each year, and how do you decide what programs work best for your students?

Stacy Meyers: Yes, my curriculum and assessments are always evolving and changing to meet the needs of the students. I work directly with school and college administration and the superintendents' offices, teachers, and deans for program development with an interdisciplinary and place-based learning approach.

All of the curriculum and programs I implement follow New York State Standards and, when applicable, National Science standards. Sometimes the community or the needs of the environment helps to direct the program development.

Rachel Verno: Could you tell us a little about your role as the director of education for the East Hampton Historical Society?

Stacy Meyers: I have been collaborating with the East Hampton Historical Society and the East Hampton Town Marine museum since 2005. When I decided to work full time for the Historical Society in 2018, teaching about architecture, art, and preservation spiraled into my life at a rate I never predicted.
